

REGIONAL ENGAGEMENT

- SCA designated leadership (Nancy Backus, John Chelminiak, Ed Prince) participated in an Executive Leadership Group in fall 2018 and received two briefings spring 2019.
- SCA Leads and SCA Director with Seattle and King County invited/participated in 2 joint KC CMAT/Sea Client Group/SCA meetings. 1 additional meeting is forthcoming.
- SCA PIC has received briefings nearly monthly on ongoing conversations.
- SCA designated staff with Seattle and King County Staff (Colleen Kelly, Merina Hansen, and Christa Valles) have been invited to various regularly occurring meetings, including workgroups and steering committees.

THE PROPOSED ILA & CHARTER

WHAT

- An ordinance, with an attached charter for a Public Development Authority (PDA), authorizing participation in an Interlocal Agreement (ILA).
- The ILA commits to participation in a Regional Authority to oversee and administer regional homelessness response systems and services.
- If enacted, King County would also enact a separate ordinance to establish the PDA in County Code, as agreed to in the ILA.

WHO

- King County Executive and Seattle Mayor will transmit the proposal to their respective Councils.
- All other cities within King County may elect to participate at any time.

WHEN

The proposal will be transmitted in early September.

WHAT WE HEARD | GOVERNING BOARD

- Role of elected officials in board leadership, in order to provide accountability to taxpayers and/or voters
- Inclusion of Sound Cities Association in board leadership, in order to reflect regional differences and priorities
- Priority board membership for technical experts with the knowledge and experience to drive change in the homelessness system
- Inclusion of a substantial number of people with lived experience of homelessness, or those who can represent them
- Inclusion of a substantial number of people who reflect the populations disproportionally experiencing homelessness

STEERING COMMITTEE

(5 Elected Officials)

- King County Executive
- King County Council
- Seattle Mayor
- Seattle City Council
- Sound Cities Member
- 2 Representatives appointed by People who have experienced

GOVERNING BOARD

(11 Seats)

- **Experts** with technical skills, knowledge or connections needed to drive the work
- Majority of the members would with experience, expertise or identify to credibly represent and be accountable to populations disproportionately experiencing homelessness



ADVISORY COMMITTEE

(Appointed by Governing Board as Needed; May Peform CoC Board Role if authorized)



REGIONAL ILA PARTICIPATION WHAT WE HEARD FROM CITIES

- Need an adopted plan, responsive to local needs and priorities, that drives regional priorities and funding
- Cities have had different levels of engagement in governance discussions
- Cities have different resources, which should be valued, including:
 - In-lieu staff capacity
 - Facility space
 - Funding
 - Land
 - Local expertise and relationships



Regional participation is critical—the ILA eliminates barriers that otherwise limit participation:

Who? Any City or Housing Authorities in King County may join

When? May join immediately or over time

What does joining mean? All participants would commit to align provision of in-scope homelessness services with the PDA's 5-Year implementation plan and sub-regional plans

How? The joining city or entity enacts legislation to become a party



KEY ELEMENTS: PLANNING CYCLE & STAFF

5-YEAR IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

- Required by the ILA & Charter within 18 months of the PDA's formation
- Incorporates the direction of the Regional Action Plan and requirements of Service Agreements to guide the PDA's operations
- Developed by the PDA, approved by the Governing Board, and confirmed or rejected by the Steering Committee
- Inclusive of sub-regionally tailored context, needs, priorities, and approaches

ANNUAL BUDGET

- Proposed by the Executive Director, approved by the <u>Governing Board</u>, and confirmed or rejected by the <u>Steering Committee</u>
- Informs resource requests made to each party in accordance with the 5-year Strategic Plan,
 Service Agreements with funders, and <u>subject to Council appropriation</u>

STAFFING

- The Charter mandates an Executive Director, hired by the Governing Board
- The Charter mandates an Ombuds Office
- The Charter empowers the ED to hire staff to implement the 5-year plan, including sub-regional planning and implementation support, subject to budget authority and appropriation.
